INTRODUCTION

The Rotary Doctors Sweden (RDS) continues to be a key community health partner, we are actively implementing community health programs with an aim of increasing healthy living in the community. This is normally a joint cooperation between the community and The County Governments, department of health. We have cooperation with TransZoia, West Pokot and Kakamega counties, in Kenya.

Our community health programs, reach out to members of the community through an organized mobile outreach programs offering: curative, preventive, and promotive services. The community are therefore able to access the doctor who examines and give treatment, family planning services, antenatal clinics, immunization and health education.

Our mentorship program, is aimed at developing more skills for trained health workers, developing working health care systems and structures, the objective is to improve health care service delivery in specific identified hospital. Doctors here work together with health care workers mainly in hospital, the current hospital piloting this is Kachiliba Hospital in West Pokot.

Rotary Doctors Sweden Special project program aims at improving the health outcomes in the community! Under this program; we promote access to clean water in the community by protection of community water sources (springs) and sinking of shallow wells. We have

also been able to trigger the community to take personal initiative to eliminate open defecation through Community Led Total sanitation program, many villages have celebrated being declared ODF. Other activities in this program includes, public health awareness campaigns (jiggers, Scabies and Malnutrition) training of both CHVs and dispensary and health center health staffs.


Kasei for Change is one of our newest community advocacy programs, the target group being women in Kasei location Pokot North Sub County in West Pokot county. The programs aim is to support to local community women and men to lead in advocacy to respecting women reproductive health rights. Targeted community activity vices being addressed includes, Female Genital Mutilation, Child marriages, school drop outs among girls, increase acceptance and access to family planning among others.





- This period because of a lot of rains we had more malaria positive compared to other previous years.

- Skin diseases and wounds are still a problem in the jeep line, mostly common among children below 10 years. Many families use the same house with animals and this could be one of the reasons.
- Need for health education to families on how to avoid these skin related issues.
- Average disease per person 1.3 remains the same as last years.



GENERAL COMMENT ON PREVENTIVE SERVICES.

- Compared to last year such a time, we have experience decline in Antenatal clinics by 47%, Family planning by 24% and fully immunized child by 31%.

- This reduction is mainly due to the fact that at the same time, we exited some clinics and started some and usually preventive services have a slow start in new sites.
- Malaria positivity though increased tremendously from a low of 6.1% to a high of 20.9% this year.

- For immunization, the numbers coming for different visit has moved up by more than 60% compared to such a time last year, though the number of fully immunized child has remained the same. Need for well-planned defaulter tracing!

JIGGERS CAMPGAIN TREATMENT REPORT IN KIPTOGOT AND JAMANUR VILLAGES

The jigger campaign was done for three days (10th to 12th of August 2019]. The target for Kiptogot was 49 and 29 for Jamanur. Activities that took place during the campaign health education on predisposing

factors, prevention and control of jiggers infestation and treatment. We surpassed the target by 41% which is the difference of the initial target and the current target

Follow-up and issuing of shoes was done on 17th August 2019

To prevent reoccurrence we demonstrated on the disinfection of the houses using cow dung, omo and pesticide in the presence of parents and their children, and then we gave shoes to those treated for three consecutive days.

WEST POKOT LANSLIDE MISSION

The land slide occurred on the 23rd November 2019 and it affected three villages namely Nyarkulian, Perua and sebit. Total affected victims were 7,309 with 72 dead cases and 22 an accounted for.

Other organizations giving help at the camps included Kenya Red cross doing the registration and first aid, UNHCR that provided the tents, Action Against Hunger providing food stuffs, Alkhair foundation providing food stuffs, TecklaLourupe foundation providing blankets and The county government also provided blankets.

There was good cooperation between RDS team and other organizations which supported us with an ambulance for referral cases, distribution of blankets, security and three government nurses.

Our role as the rotary doctors' team was to supply basic acute care, triage and asses the medical situation, stabilize and refer patients to a higher level of care. We did not give out food (apart from baby porridge)

Our team was made of two rotary doctors, three nurses, three laboratory technologists/counselors, two pharmacists, a dental assistant and one social worker. We administered curative services for two days and below is a summary of the conditions we attended to;
